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## Winter is coming for your home!

It's coming - the white, windy weather of winter. Now is the time to protect your home and wallet with a quick window and door checkup to make needed repairs and reduce costs.

Clear sills and moving parts of dirt and debris. Debris like sand, dirt or leaves can get caught in window sills and moving parts of windows or doors. Clean these areas with a dry paintbrush to create a tighter seal and enhance window and door performance.

Check weather stripping. Re-attach or replace loose or worn weather stripping around windows and doors. Loose weather stripping can let cold air in, reducing energy efficiency.

Reapply caulk or sealant around windows and doors. To help reduce potential drafts and leaks, reseal areas around windows and doors that may have been exposed to heavy weather or extreme sunlight, creating breaks in caulk or sealant.

Install snap-in blinds or shades. Snap-in between-the-glass blinds or shades help insulate your home from cold outdoor temperatures. Pella Designer Series windows and patio doors



feature convenient between-the-glass options to add energy efficiency and privacy.

Repair or replace damaged exterior surfaces. Cracked or deteriorated wood on the roof or near the foundation is typically associated with water penetration and may allow moisture or cold air to leak into your home. Consult a professional to help correct any roof or drainage problems around your home.

Replace old windows and doors with energy-efficient ones. Replace single-pane glass or older windows with energy-efficient, double- or triple-pane glass versions, such as those offered by Pella, and made with insulating argon. (BPT)









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## What's NEW in GARAGE DOOR OPENERS

Your automatic garage door opener works just fine, you say. It's opened and closed your door reliably for years. All you've needed to do is change the light bulb or the battery in the remote control once in a while. Replace it? What could be new in garage door openers? Plenty.

Safety First - If your opener was installed prior to 1993, you may be missing out on a great safety feature that is now required on all U.S. and Canadian openers manufactured since that time – photoelectric eyes or some other device that provides equivalent protection against entrapment.

Photoelectric eyes – mounted about six inches above the floor – cast an invisible beam across the door opening. If a door is closing and, for example, a child or pet were running underneath the door, they would "break" the beam, causing the door to automatically reverse.

Because your garage door is the heaviest and largest moving part of your home, a new opener with entrapment protection makes a great deal of sense, particularly if you have small children. (Note – It's important, too, to teach children that

the garage door system is not a plaything.)

Your garage door professional can help you choose the system that makes sense for your needs – and he or she is also fully trained to install and test the system for optimum performance and safe operation.

**Key to the castle** - Remote control or external keypads have become the new "house keys" for many homeowners.

"Keypad use has more than doubled in the past 10 years," said Tom Wadsworth, editor of Door & Access Systems, a magazine for the garage door

- · Invest in a heating/cooling maintenance plan. ### **FALL REMINDERS: Before the snow flies**

- Arrange to have your furnace professionally cleaned and inspected.

- Have carpets cleaned to improve indoor air quality this winter.
- Book an appointment to have your chimney cleaned and safety-checked.
